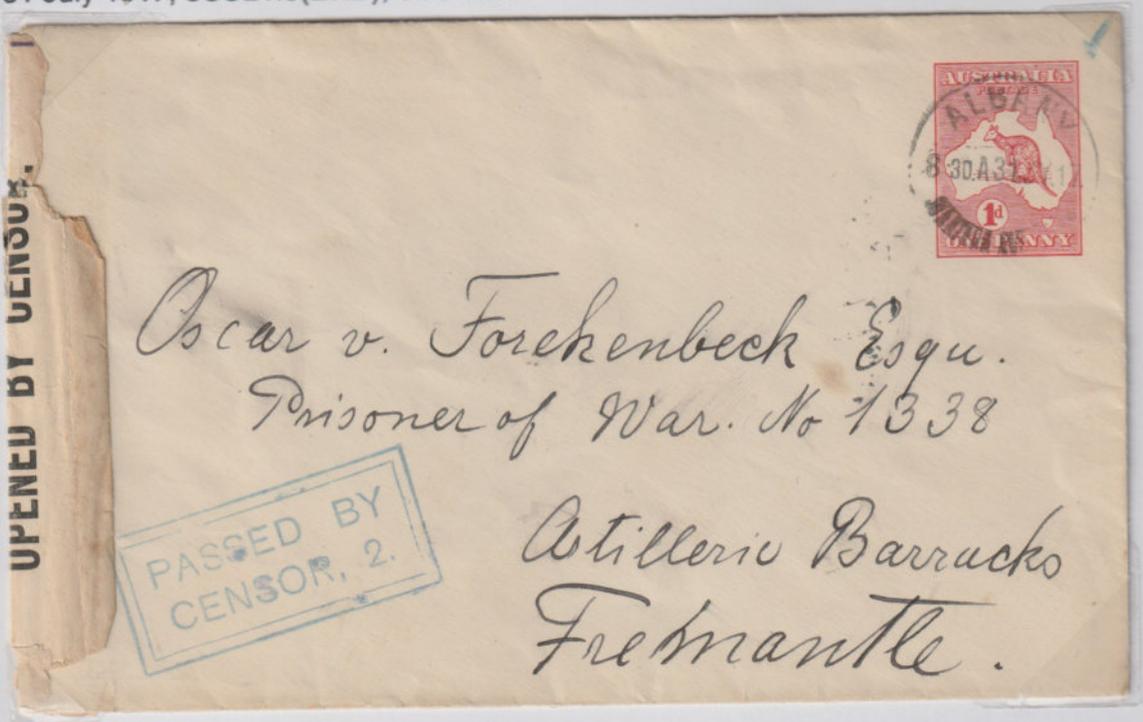

(31/7/17 - 3/8/17)
(Only recorded examples of this label)**

Western Australia belatedly fell into line with the Australian practice of using censor labels stating 'Opened by Censor.' Although inscribed 'Prisoner of War', Forchenbeck was an internee who had been repatriated from Liverpool NSW.

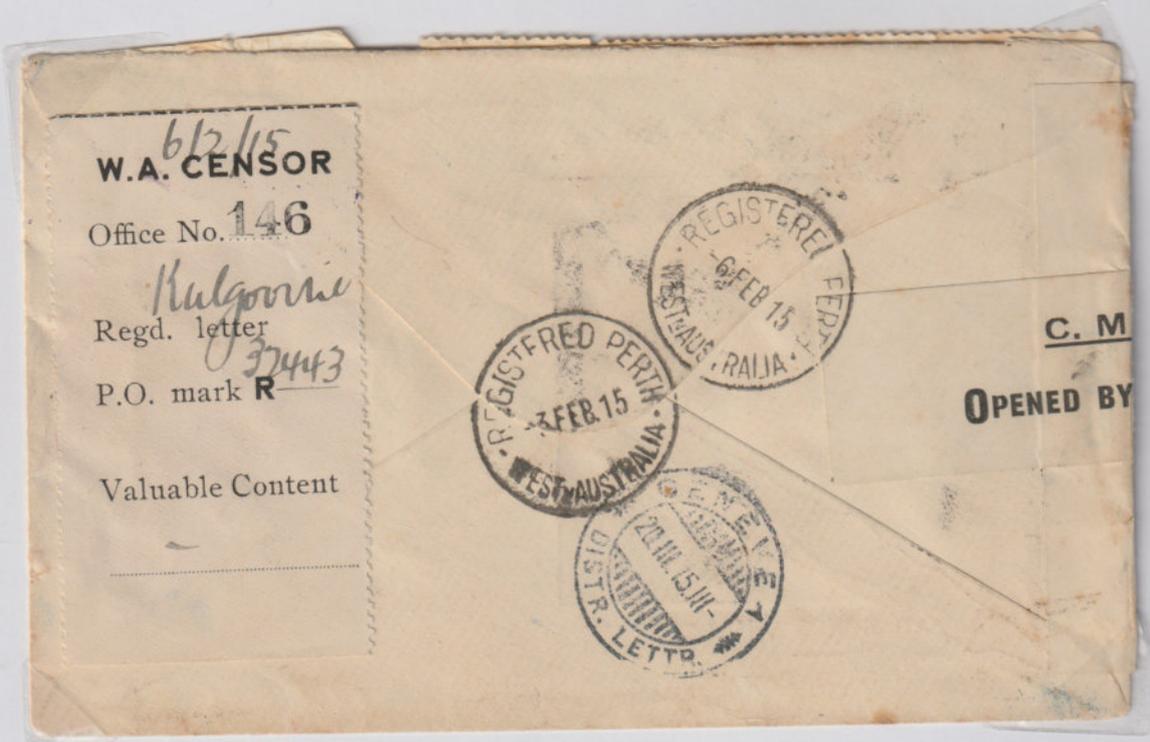
W.A. CENSOR REGISTRATION RECEIPT LABEL

(This is the only recorded censor registration receipt in Australia)

This is the only recorded example of a cover struck with two different censor cachets.
Double 2½d postage rate plus 3d registration.

H.M. CUSTOMS 1918

Some mail in 1915 from the AIF in Egypt was intercepted by Customs before being censored. This 1918 mail indicated both Customs and the Censor were checking for illegal trading with the enemy.

Perth 12 June 1915, 5CC1.3, Sydney censor cachet

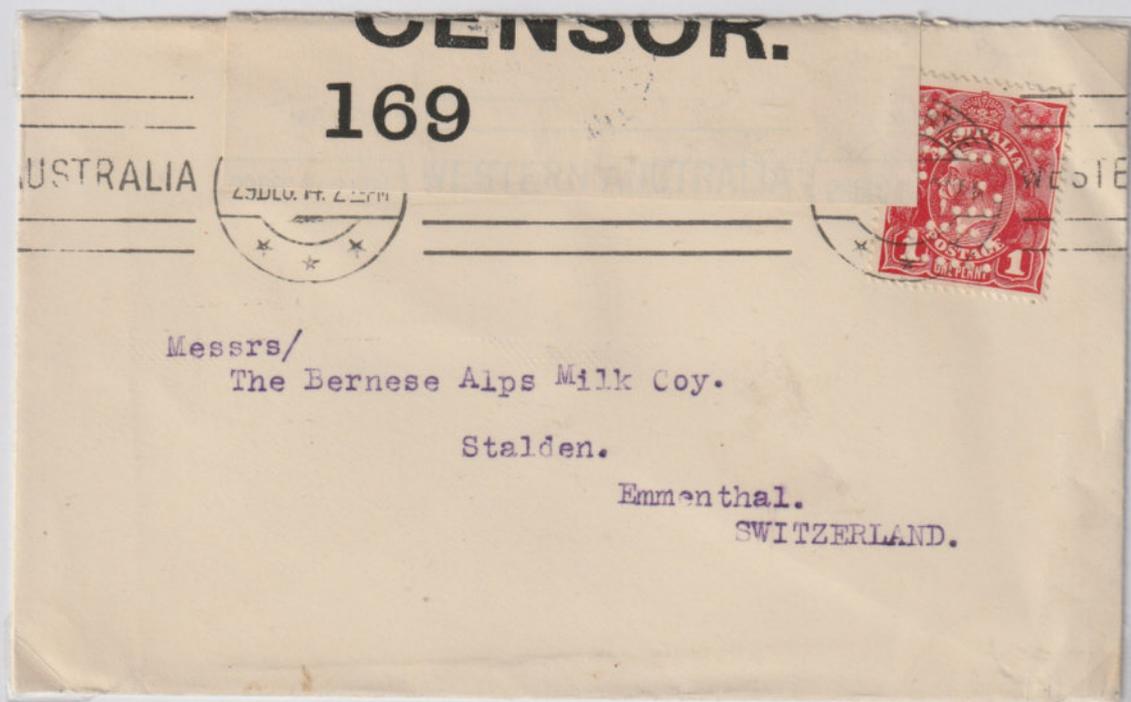


Guildford 12 April 1917, 5CC1.3 mss 2

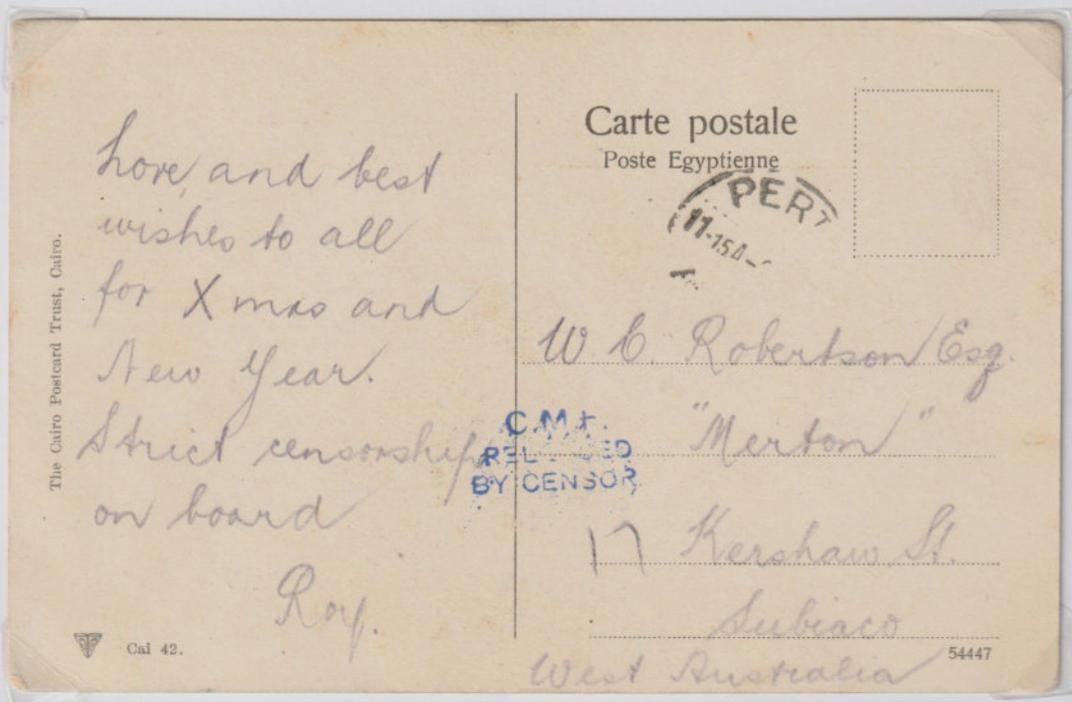
Mail to and from Western Australia could be intercepted and censored en route.

EARLY A.I.F. MAIL CENSORED ON ARRIVAL

Mail handling procedures and censorship of mail from the First Convoy were not well established so some mail was censored on arrival. The top card is the only recorded example of a stamp cancelled by the censor cachet. Possibly posted at Colombo. "What do you think of the Australian Navy?", 5CC1.2

CENSORSHIP OF INTERNEE MAIL

On 10 August 1914 all German males were required to report to a police station and some were interned on Rottnest island. The circular Prisoner of War Letter C.M.F. 5th MD. Indicated the letter was censored under the authority of the Commandant on Rottnest and was passed, entitled to free postage.

CENSORSHIP OF POW MAIL

Crews from captured German ships *Greifswald* (6 August), *Neumunster* (16 August) and *Thuringen* (26 August) were taken to Rottneest as prisoners of war.
 Sender P.O.W. Johannes Korff, Ships Offr, Rottneest Island, censor blue pencil tick, Major Meeks censor cachet, 5CC1.3, London circular Passed Free Prisoner of War cachet, London POW Bureau struck out and letter forwarded to Germany.

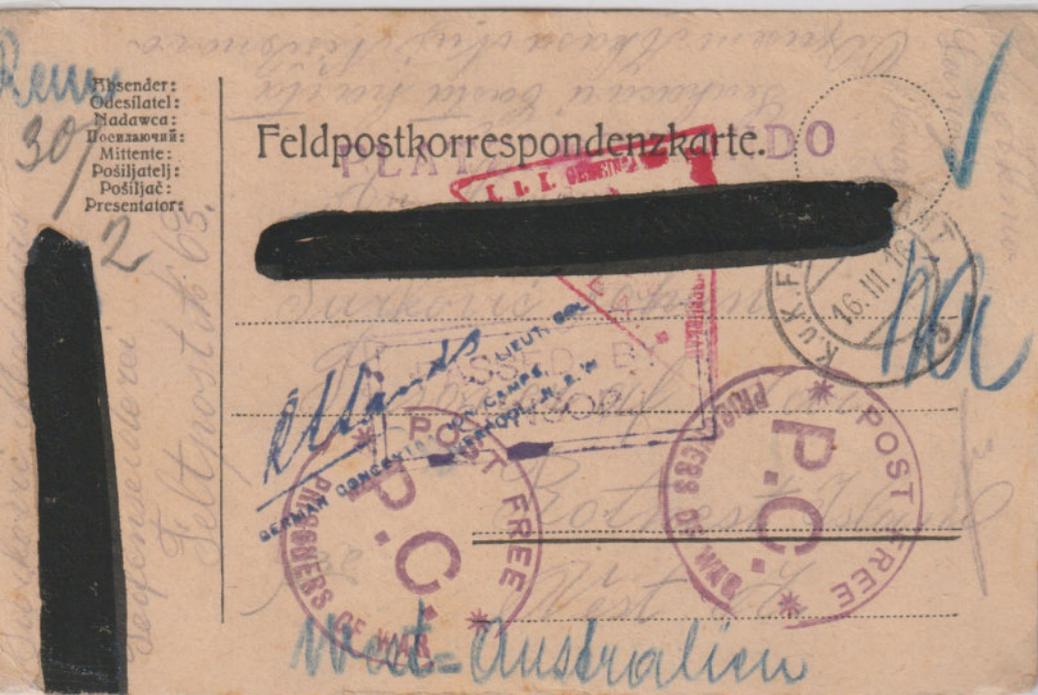

Rottnest Island Camp was closed on 22 November 1915. Some internees were released on parole but most internees and all POW were transferred to NSW.

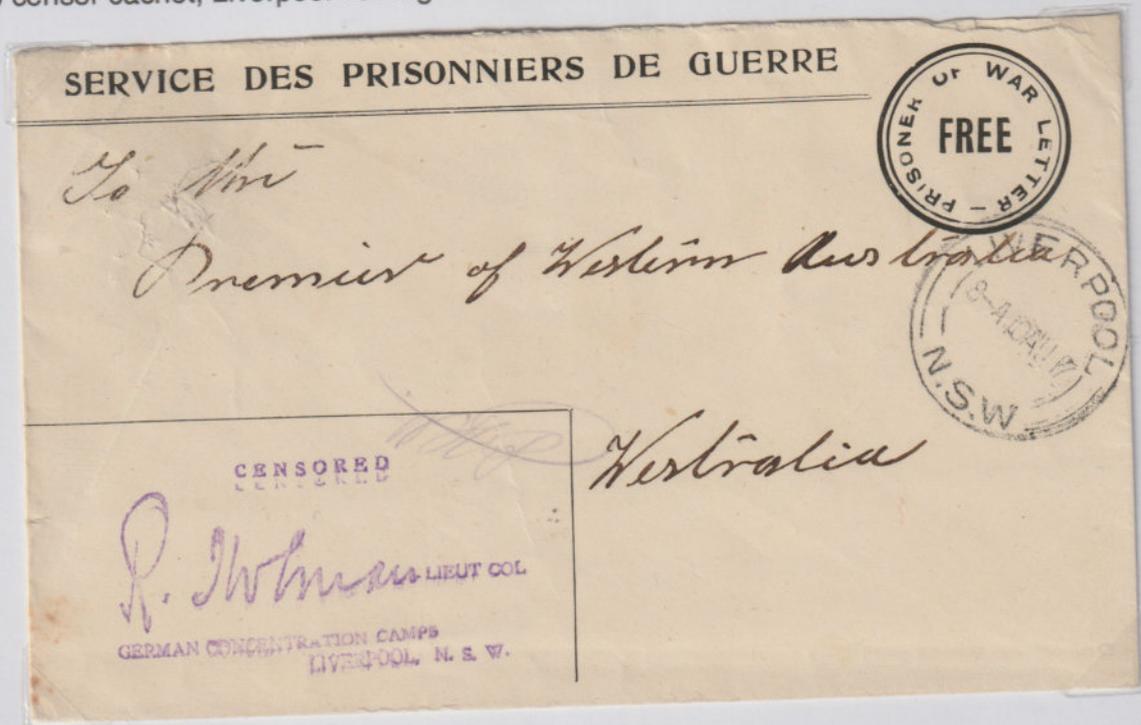

GERMAN CONCENTRATION CAMP, LIVERPOOL, NSW

Camp censorship was deemed sufficient for these letters. Postage was free but registration was not.

ROYAL AUSTRALIAN ARTILLERY BARRACKS FREMANTLE

After the closure of Rottnest Camp, some enemy aliens were arrested or sought imprisonment because they could not get work due to discrimination against them. The RAGA Barracks held 8 internees in March 1916.

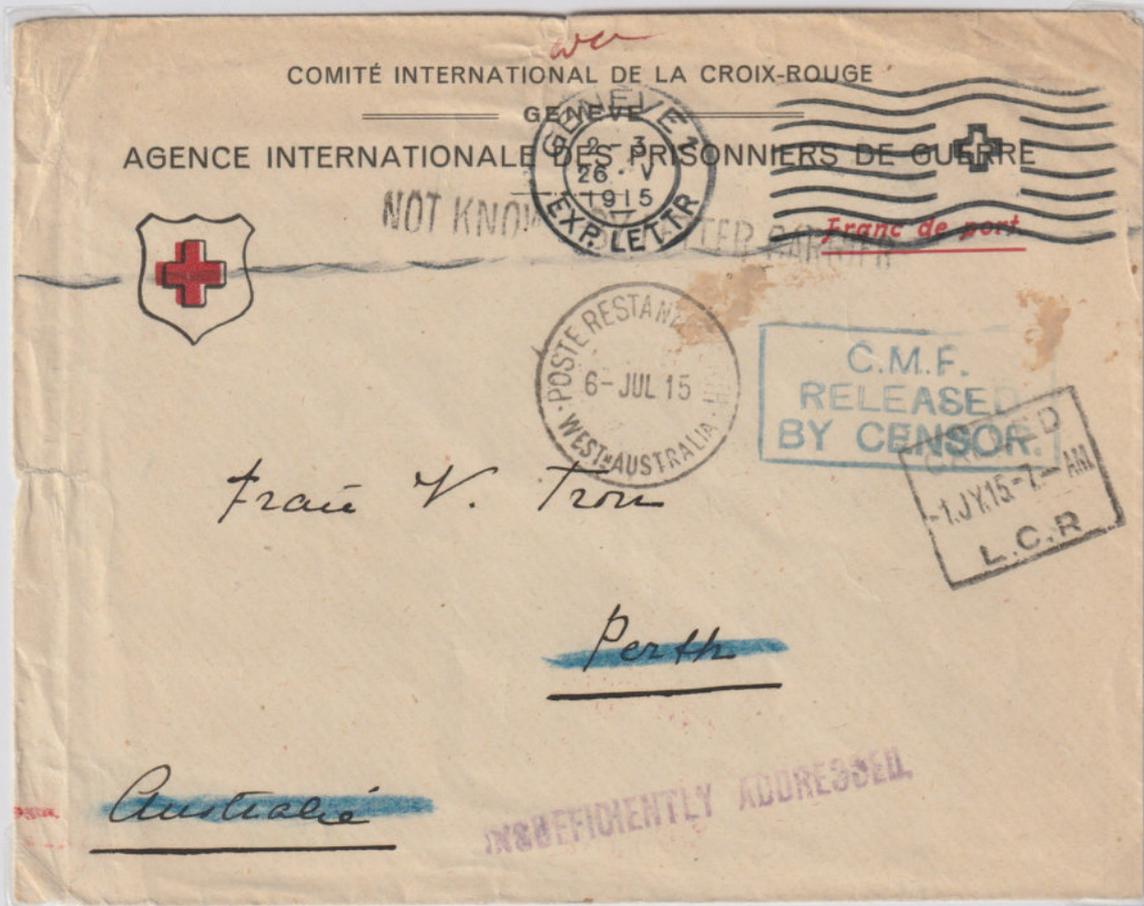
Jacques Bohme had been under surveillance in Geraldton before his arrest. The writer apparently knew of his arrest but not where he was detained.

RED CROSS POW AGENCY

The International Red Cross POW Agency in Switzerland sought and recorded information about the location of POW and internees in conjunction with the branch of the British Red Cross Society established in Melbourne and subsequently in all other capitals.

This attempt to contact the addressee failed.

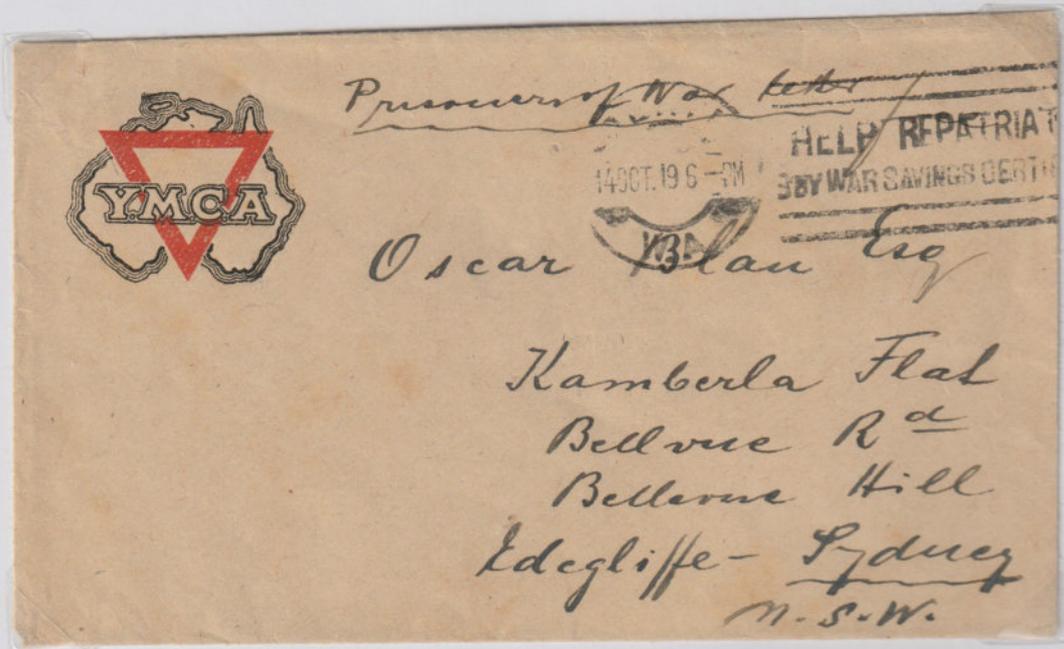


The Swiss POW Agency handled almost 170 million postal items in 1918.

REPATRIATION: CENSORSHIP CEASED

The Geneva Convention required all POW be repatriated after the war. Some internees were also repatriated and were entitled to free postage while in transit.

Fremantle 14 October 1919



Inscribed OAS instead of POW so this card was struck with the AIF Postage Free cachet. Probably posted on board SS *Rugia* at Fremantle September 1919.

Oscar Blau had been interned and then released to run his business in Sydney. He amassed a hoard of POW mail from Liverpool Camp and sealed it up in a wall of his office where it was found when the office was demolished in the 1990s. It is the most significant source of World War 1 POW mail in Australia.
